Mayors Message

The fall issue of the Village's newsletter highlights new staff, features the Altamont Rescue Squad, and describes initiatives that are underway for Altamont's youth and seniors. Please note the time sensitive calendar information on the last page. Two inserts are included in the newsletter.

One insert provides information on housing weatherization, home repairs, and to those facing possible foreclosure. The Village will sponsor its yearly workshops on Home Energy Assistance Programs (HEAP) in conjunction with the



Maple Avenue has a new tot playground! The new facility is a result of a multi-year effort by many people and organizations, both public and private. The components of the playground were selected after several consultations with parents and board members of the Altamont Cooperative Preschool, and designed to be age-appropriate for ages 5 and under.

The cost of the playground equipment has been supported entirely by private donations.

New Tot Playground

Over \$ 17,000 has been raised so far, in amounts ranging from \$ 20 to \$ 5,000, from nearly 100 individuals and families. Additional proceeds from the Barker-Schilling raffle, the Altamont Cooperative Preschool, and from local resident Keith Lee's 60th birthday celebration made the purchase of the equipment possible.

Since the Village Trustees voted in 2003 to keep the area "forever green", the former site of the tennis court on Maple Avenue has gradually been transformed. In 2004, residents began to clear the site, and in 2005, a small front gar-

den was planted, and an iron entrance arch was installed. Planting has been ongoing in the rear flower beds. During 2006/07, Carl Schilling, a local craftsman, and other volunteers donated their labor and talents to design and construct a shelter on the site.

With the dedicated assistance of the Village's DPW staff, the playground site was prepped, extra drainage installed, the equipment placed, the surrounding supports installed, and the wood chips spread. The Village will provide signage, trash receptacles, and other final touches to ensure that our young, future residents can safety enjoy the new playground.

From the Clerk's Desk:


Water and Sewer Rent bills will be mailed on October 1st. To avoid penalties, Water Rents are due by October 31st and Sewer Rents are payable by November 30th.

Village Property Taxes not paid by November 1st will be relevied to the Albany County Department of Finance for collection. For information call 447-7082.

Fall Water Main Flushing

The Village Department of Public Works will be conducting aggressive water main flushing beginning on Tuesday, September 30, 2008 and will continue through Friday, October 17, 2008. Flushing will occur Monday through Fridays, weather and conditions permitting between the hours of 8:30 am and 3 pm. During the cycle, you may experience discoloration in the water. Please check your water before doing laundry. For additional information, or if discoloration persists, please notify the Village Offices at 861-8554 Monday through Friday between 9 am and 4 pm.

Fall Yard Waste Collection



Please do not place leaves on pavement or in ditches as they could inhibit the flow of storm water.

Please do not include bottles, cans, branches, stones, or any foreign refuse in leaf piles as they could be hazardous to the equipment and the workmen. If you choose to bag your leaves, use biodegradable paper bags which should be closed and sealed. Brush and branches must be no larger than 2" diameter, be bundled in twine, no longer than 4' in length and must be able to be lifted onto truck by one man. Bags and brush collected on Wednesdays during collection period.





The Altamont Rescue Squad was founded in 1937 and is the oldest volunteer Rescue Squad in NYS. ARS serves the village, Guilderland Center and portions of the hilltowns. Services are supplemented by Town of Guilderland Paramedics. The ARS is funded by the Town of Guilderland. To date, the Altamont Rescue Squad

has received over 560 calls this year. Volunteers are always needed, especially to cover mid week evening shifts.
