ARCHIVES AND MUSEUM ANNOUNCES BOOK RELEASE AND NEW EXHIBIT


The upcoming book titled *Images of America: Altamont* has been submitted to Arcadia Publishing. Author Keith Lee was assisted in the production of the book by volunteers Connie Rue (Research), Ron Ginzburg (Image Production), and Laura Shore (Editing Assistant). The Curator for the Archives, Marijo Dougherty, was the project director. A grant from the Altamont Community Tradition (ACT) along with private donations helped fund the project. A spring book signing event will be held in the Village Hall.

The cataloguing and re-

cording of some 60 historic letters is nearing completion. The handwritten letters were penned by Mary C. Crouse (1832-67) and sent to her parents, Dr. Frederick and Mrs. Frederick Crouse, (formerly of Rt. 146 and Grand Street). The letters were written while she attended the NYS Teachers College in Albany. Annette Kramer, an archives volunteer, has been diligently interpreting and transferring the text to a searchable database. This process protects the letters from any further deterioration, making the text of the letters available for re-

searchers and other viewing.

The next exhibition in the Hallway Gallery will open in early February. Titled **Ingenious Minds: Early Altamont Inventors**. The exhibit features the inventions of Charles V. Beebe; Alanson Dietz; Philip Edelman; Fay C. Hayes; John Mersellus; Nelson Merrill; W. G. Seeley; Wheeler D. Wright, and many more.



VILLAGE HISTORY NOW ON FACEBOOK

Charles V. Beebe (1856-1936) started his business as a harness-maker in 1868 in Guilderland Center, before opening his shop in Altamont in 1891. He continued working at his trade until just a few weeks before his death. Charles Beebe was known for his

high quality harness goods. His reputation earned him patrons from Altamont and many outlying areas. Mr. Beebe received a US Patent in 1887 for his seat for agricultural machines. The object of the invention was to create a swinging seat that would protect the

driver from injury from sudden jerks and jolts of the machine. He was a charter member of the Altamont Hose Company, and President of the Village 1899-1901.

snow and ice. Jeff Moller, Superintendent of Public Works, requests that residents also keep sidewalks clear of debris such as newspapers, trash containers and other for-

eign objects that can be hazardous to both the equipment and workmen. Snow banks can create hazard for both children and drivers. Children tend to climb and

play near snow banks and may accidently fall into roadways. Snow banks may also create slight line issues entering and exiting driveways, drivers should use caution.

S P R I N G W A T E R F L U S H I N G

The Village of Altamont will start hydrant flushing on April 1st. Flushing will occur between the hours of 8:30 am to 3:00 pm Monday through Friday. During the cycle, residents may

experience discoloration in their water. Residents should check their water prior to doing laundry. For additional information, contact the Village Office.

S P R I N G B R U S H P I C K - U P

Brush and leaf collection will start on April 1st. Leaves must be in biodegradable paper bags. Bags must be closed and sealed. Please do not include bottles, cans or any foreign refuse in the bags as it could be hazardous to the equipment and the workman.

Brush and branches must be no longer than 2” in diameter, **bundled in twine**, and no longer than 4’ in length. Bags and brush should not be placed on pavement or in ditches as they could inhibit the flow of storm water.
